Our 17-day, 1,860 mile "One Way" Caravan is designed for guests who want to travel to Alaska with an RV caravan but want to have the maximum free time to explore Alaska at their pace. Guests on this tour are on their own after 17 days to explore Alaska at their leisure. The "One Way" option would also allow guests to take the ferry back to the "Lower 48".

Our RV Caravan Tours allow you to experience the unspoiled wilderness and local culture in your own RV without the hassles of planning your stops or worrying about where to get food or fuel. We make sure you are free to enjoy your vacation.

Tour Guide

We feature an experienced guide who will guide you along every mile of the trek. They begin by conducting a group meeting to make sure you are well informed about the trek ahead of you. They distribute your copy of the Milepost and a binder that contains maps and a daily itinerary as well as other useful information like the best places to stock up on food and where to get fuel. Your guide will periodically conduct update meetings along the way and is always available for your questions. If you want, the guide can assign you a Traveling Buddy so that you can watch out for each other during the day's travels. The guide will check you in each night to make sure that you arrive safely and make sure you get help if you fail to check-in.

Assistant Guide

This guide always is the last to leave each day. He will travel behind you to make sure that he is there to help if you break down along the way. The Assistant carries tools and fuel to assist you. If he can't make the repairs needed to get you going again, he will summon help and will always be at your side until help arrives.

Travel Itinerary Book

The Travel Itinerary Book that you will receive at the beginning of the trek includes all of the information you will need to get safely through each day. It includes maps for each segment of the trek, a mileage log, suggested activities along the way, all planned events and safety information. This will be your daily reference. By the way, we plan each segment so that you are not too rushed. There is plenty of time to sight-see and stop whenever you want.

We have planned the entire Alaska Adventure. All reservations are made at first rate RV parks. Most of the RV parks have full hook-ups including water, sewer and electricity. Some even provide cable TV. Fuel stops will be noted in the Travel Itinerary Book.

Itinerary - 17-Day Alaska "One Way" Adventure

Day 1 Dawson Creek

We begin our trek with a welcome dinner, orientation and social in Dawson Creek, British Columbia. Dawson Creek is Mile 0 of the Alaska Highway and Mile 0 of our 1,860 mile tour of British Columbia, the Yukon and Alaska.

Day 2 Ft. Nelson

Our first stop is Ft. Nelson, BC. Here we will receive a Visitor Presentation and see the Heritage Center.

Day 3 Muncho Lake

Our next stop will be at beautiful Muncho Lake . Muncho Lake gets its deep azure color from minerals leached from the surrounding mountains. Here we take a boat tour of Muncho Lake and have a Wine and Cheese Party.

Day 4 Watson Lake

Today we travel to Watson Lake where we tour the Sign Post Village and see an informative video on the Alaska Highway Construction.

Day 5 Teslin

We stop for the night on the shores of Nisutlin Lake and visit the Yukon Wildlife Gallery.

Day 6 Whitehorse

Tour Whitehorse. See the grand old sternwheeler, the SS Klondike, visit the longest wooden fish ladder in North America, the scenic Whitehorse Dam, the Yukon Visitor Center, and Miles Canyon lookout.

Day 7 Whitehorse

We will also enjoy a beautiful river cruise across Lake Schwatka and up the famous Yukon River, through Miles Canyon. Next we attend the Frantic Follies vaudeville review a turn-of-the-century show that presents a lively evening of fun and nostalgia for the entire family.

Day 8 Destruction Bay

Our next stop is at Destruction Bay along the western shore of Kluane Lake, the largest lake in the Yukon.

Day 9 Tok

We then travel into Alaska and stop for the night in Tok. Here we will partake of a delicious salmon bake dinner and see a dog sled demonstration.

Day 10 Fairbanks

We then travel to the end of the Alaska Highway in Delta Junction and on to Fairbanks which is known as "The Heart of Alaska".

Day 11 Fairbanks

Cruise into the history of Interior Alaska, aboard the authentic sternwheeler Riverboat Discovery III.

Day 12 Fairbanks

Visit the University of Alaska Museum and Botanical Gardens.

Day 13 Denali NP

Travel south on the Parks Highway through Nenana and Healy to Denali National Park. Here we attend the Cabin Night Dinner and Show; an evening filled with entertainment, hospitality and good food.

Day 14 Denali NP

Narrated bus tour takes you into the heart of Denali National Park for spectacular scenery and wildlife. See 20,320 ft. Mt. McKinley, North America's tallest peak.

Day 15 Talkeetna

Stop over at Talkeetna, Alaska, the traditional departing place for Denali climbers. Here you will learn about the history of the local settlers and walk through the original town site.

Day 16 Anchorage

Continue traveling south on the Parks Highway to Anchorage, Alaska. We will be staying in Anchorage for 2 days. Join the staff for an Ice Cream Social.

Day 17 Anchorage

Trolley Tour - A great way to see the highlights of Anchorage visiting popular destinations including the Anchorage Museum of History & Art, the Alaska Native Heritage Center, Earthquake Park and Merrill Field. Sourdough Mining Company - Dine in an atmosphere of warm Alaskan hospitality. Enjoy a farewell dinner at the Sourdough Mining Company Restaurant is a replica of an old mill house. After your delicious dinner, see "The Adventures of Dusty Sourdough" in the sourdough Tent City

Theater. Dusty will take you back to the gold rush days with song, storytelling and humor.

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Alaska Optional Extra Cost Tours

Day in Barrow Alaska - \$590 per person

Enjoy a flight departing from Fairbanks to Barrow, the northernmost city in the US. A tour guide will meet you in Barrow and escort you to the Cultural Center, Inupiat Traditional Dances, and Blanket Toss. Bring your swimsuit if you want to take a dip in the Arctic Ocean. Spend the entire day in Barrow before boarding your flight back to Fairbanks. Duration is all-day.

Journey Above the Arctic Circle - \$360 per person

A narrated journey to Bush Alaska, where the Yukon River crosses above the Arctic Circle. Guides show you contemporary life in the Native Village of Fort Yukon. Enjoy the spectacular scenery of the White Mountains and Yukon Flats from the window seat of your twin-engine aircraft. Fly over Fort Knox Gold Mine, the largest open pit gold mine in North America. Duration is approximately 4 hours.

Brooks Range, Gates of the Arctic National Park - \$640 per person

Ancient mountains, arctic tundra, Eskimo culture, come together for a truly memorable Arctic Journey, far above the Arctic Circle. The Brooks Range is one of the most remote regions in the world. Fly with modern day bush pilots on scheduled bush-mail flights and experience how Alaskans travel and live above the Arctic Circle where there are no roads. Enjoy spectacular scenery from the window seat of your twin-engine aircraft, flying over the Alaska Oil Pipeline, across the Yukon River and into Gates of the Arctic National Park. Experience today's life in the Nunamiut Eskimo Village of Anaktuvuk Pass and visit a small cultural history museum of the Nunamiut people, the Simon Paneak Memorial Museum. Duration is all-day.

McKinley (Denali) Summit Tour - \$280 per person

Experience flying around the summit of Mt. McKinley. On this extensive flight, you will have fantastic vistas of both sides of Mt. McKinley. You will see the Kahiltna Glacier, the Climber's High Camp at 14,000 feet, Wickersham Wall, and the Don Sheldon Amphitheater on the Ruth Glacier. See climbers ascending to the summit. Duration is 1 ½ hours.

Salmon and Halibut Fishing - \$340 per person

A full-day, guided fishing expedition for salmon and halibut. All tackle and bait is provided and the deck hands are eager to assist you in reeling in your catch. Nearby packers can fast-freeze and ship your catch anywhere in the US. Duration is all-day.

Bear Viewing Day Trip - \$590 per person This scenic flight takes you to the western coast of Cook Inlet to Katmai National Park. Bear viewing, flight seeing, glaciers, volcanoes, salmon, wildlife...this trip offers it all. Witness Alaska brown bears as they fish for migrating salmon. Our guide allows us to approach safely for those up close photo opportunities. Mid-June through Mid-August are the best times to view bears. Tour includes pilot/guide experienced in bear behavior. Duration – all day.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. How many miles do we drive per day? The mileage varies each day based on availability of campgrounds and road conditions. The daily mileage is planned so that if you leave the campground by 9:00 am, you can easily arrive at the next campground by 2:00 pm.

2. I want to bring my motor home. Do I need a towed vehicle? While it is not required that you tow a vehicle, many guests enjoy using it to sightsee and run errands after they arrive at the campground. You must weigh the chance that it could get damaged from the gravel roads, the extra cost in tolls/ferries/insurance against the convenience of having available transportation.

3. Can I get a refund on my tour? You will get a refund as follows:

- xxx • Up to 60 days prior to rendezvous you will get a 100% refund
- xxx • Between 60 days prior to rendezvous and the departure date you will get a 100% refund less \$300 administrative fee xxx and any non-refundable deposits made on your behalf
- xxx • While on the tour you will get a prorated refund

4. Is internet access available? Yes. Most campgrounds have dial-up or wireless connections. You must have an 802.11b card in your computer in order to use the wireless service.

5. How can my family contact me in case of an emergency? We provide a list of the campgrounds we will be staying at each day of the journey including contact information. Many of our guests leave a copy of this with their loved ones in case they need to contact them.

6. Is emergency medical service available? Yes. Keep in mind though that when we travel in remote areas, response times will generally be slower.

7. What if I breakdown on the road? Our assistant travels in the back of the pack. He will not pass any coach on our tour. When he sees one of our coaches stopped along the highway, he will stop and provide assistance if needed.

8. Can I bring my pet? Absolutely. We only stay at campgrounds that allow pets. Most campgrounds offer pet sitting services if you need to be away for extended periods of time.

9. Do we have full services every night of the tour? Generally, there is electric, water and sewer available at the campgrounds. In the more remote areas only 15 amp service, and water are available. There may be several nights of dry camping planned for your tour.

10. How much free time is available? A lot. Travel times are generally planned so that you will get to the campground by 2:00 pm. There are also free days in the schedule.

11. Can we buy food along the way? All major towns have grocery stores. Our trip documentation will help you to plan food purchases. Almost all of the campgrounds have restaurants within walking distance.

12. Are there any evening activities? We plan an Ice Cream Social, a Wine and Cheese Party, several dessert nights and based on the desires of the group, we plan bingo, cards and potluck dinners.

How Our Caravan is Different

1. We only run small caravans (17 coaches or less). We feel that the small caravans are much more enjoyable for our guests. Many of our guests have built friendships that have endured far beyond the end of the trek.
2. We treat our guests as individuals. Our staff gets to know each guest on a first name basis. We don't make you wear company logo hats or jackets.
3. We don't run our caravans like a military excursion. Our guests are free to leave the campground when they want each morning. Our guests can travel on their own during the day if they want and rejoin the group at the next campground. Our guests can even leave the caravan and rejoin at a later date. We offer the maximum amount of personal freedom and choice.
4. We provide each guest a complete itinerary at the start of the tour. The itinerary not only includes everything that we do as a group, but also includes;
 - xxx • suggestions of things to see and do while traveling,
 - xxx • maps and driving directions so that you can find the campgrounds
 - xxx • a wealth of other useful information like where to buy fuel, the location of the Wal-Marts and emergency contact information
5. We provide morning coffee to help get you going.
6. Our guide arrives at the next campground early and is waiting with pre-assigned campsites for each of our guests. You don't even need to check-in at the office.
7. All of our tours include downloadable, electronic GPS data that includes routes and points-of-interest. We even include recommended routes to the rendezvous campground.
8. Our guides have gone through an exhaustive selection process and training program. They are there to make sure you have a safe and enjoyable tour.
9. Once you reserve a tour, our prices are guaranteed not to increase. If you need to cancel while on a tour, you receive a pro-rated refund. You only pay for what you get.
